Your will is a very important document for you and your family. It provides a myriad of asset transfer abilities and often compliments the personal trusts you establish.

1. If you have a will, your estate does not go through probate.	ΤF

3. Life insurance must pass by the will.	ΤF
4. Probate typically takes more than three months.	ΤF
5. A will can create a spendthrift trust.	ΤF
